FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

Learning to Be Our Best Selves, Singly and Together



On March 6 we welcomed 80 8th-graders to Step Up Day: a day for them to visit the school they will be attending in just a few months. I spoke to these young students right after a superb performance by one of Mr. Orlofsky's jazz combos.

I can think of no better metaphor to explain what we're trying to do here at GSA than to consider why this jazz combo played so well this morning.

Nine musicians playing nine different instruments make up this combo. At different times, each of the nine musicians played a solo, demonstrating great skill and intuition resulting from practice and talent.

At other times, all nine musicians played together. Together, they needed to hit exact notes at exact times. They played, not as nine individuals, but as a single group.

Your experience at GSA will be like this. Each of you will have opportunities to become very accomplished in whatever you are passionate about — whether it's chemistry or writing poetry or welding or painting. We will help you find and pursue your individual interests while you are here.

At the same time, you will learn to work together, to blend your interests and efforts and ambitions with the group. You'll work together as lab partners, or performing in a play, or collecting food donations with other students in your advisory, or discussing a book with classmates to find an interpretation that works.

These are two very different and profoundly important ways of engaging your high school experience: learning to be the best self you can be as an individual, and learning to collaborate and work together with others. Both ways are difficult to master and both will be foundational skills for everything you choose to do after you graduate.





THE EAGLE'S EYE

GSA's 2013 Science Bowl Team attended the 13th Annual Regional Competition at the University of Southern Maine in Gorham on March 2. This is the second year we have participated, thanks to generous support from the Bary Lyon Small Fund of the Maine Community Foundation. Captain William Navarre '13 and teammates Justin Willis '14, Ethan Lowe '16, and Harrison Blake '16, were supported by Caroline Bull '15, Philomena Mattes '16, and Coach Jackie Vachon. Seventeen schools statewide participated. During the final rounds, we competed for third place overall against Waynflete Academy; the battle ended with Waynflete coming in 3rd (38) and GSA 4th (30).

On March 7, GSA hosted its first Community Service Fair. Organized by Dean of Students **Libby Rosemeier** '77, twelve peninsula organizations set up booths explaining the services they provide in the community, and offering information to students about ways they can volunteer to help. Introducing the Fair were GSA Head of School Paul Perkinson and Rob McCall of the Congregational Church. One hundred and fifty students attended the event, signing up to do community service work for the Bagaduce Music Lending Library, Blue Hill Memorial Hospital, Blue Hill Public Library, Blue Hill Peninsula Chamber of Commerce, Friendship Cottage, Marine Environmental Research Institute (MERI), Simmering Pot, Tree of Life, The Turnstyle, WERU, Great Pond Mountain Conservation Trust, and Blue Hill Heritage Trust [pictured].

At an All-School Assembly March 13, GSA Board President Marion Morris and Vice-President **Rob Clapp** '73 recognized the thirty-five year careers of two GSA teachers: Katherine Greene (Art) and Lou Graceffa (English). After noting some of the remarkable accomplishments of Katie and Lou, and thanking them for their unstinting devotion and contributions to the life of GSA, Rob and Marion presented each teacher with an original print by GSA senior Shannon Larkin.


On March 23, GSA freshmen honors students competed against 200 other freshmen and upperclassmen from top schools in the state at the Maine State Science Fair at Jackson Laboratory. Research projects were impressive and covered a wide range of topics. Hanna Gutow received an award from the US Navy for her study of the effects of tidal cycles on microplastic density. Mikhail Maksimov received an award from the US Army for his wind blade engineering project. Alyssa Chesney [pictured] received the Association for Women Geoscientists Award for her research on the effects of ocean acidification on common periwinkles. Hanna took third place in her category, Energy, Transportation and Environmental Science. The following Thursday, these students and others from Carol Bennatti's class presented their work in the GSA Library to parents, trustees, faculty, and staff.

Our wrestlers pulled off a superb season this year. Senior Jordan Lord placed 1st in the PVC (Penobscot Valley Conference) tournament, winning the 138-pound class PVC Class C title and the coaches' MVP award for top wrestler of the conference. Jordan then went on to place 1st at Regionals, and 2nd in the Class C States. Jordan graduates with a phenomenal 145 career wins. His teammate **Alex Turanski**, also a senior, earned his 100th win this season as well. Said Coach Jerome Lawther, "These two outstanding athletes have set records that will be very difficult to match, much less surpass!"



















For their Independent Study project, seniors Sarah Clifford, Ashley Miles, and Katy Gray worked with Chef Frank Bianco in the kitchen, learning to develop menus, compute costs, purchase products, and, of course, prepare delicious meals. The girls worked thirty hours each week, and learned to prepare squash soup, chicken stew, vegetable salads, lasagnes, grilled fish, desserts and more. "It's been a great experience, not only for them but for us," said Chef Bianco. "We're going to miss them!"

On March 6 and 7, Drama Club students under the direction of Moira **McMahon** produced Seamus Heaney's one-act play, The Burial at Thebes, for the Maine Drama Festival. Performing were: Nolan Ellsworth '13 as Creon, Lorna Stephens '13 as Antigone, Mackenzie Tefft '13 as Ismene, Chelsey Staples '13 as Athena and second Messenger, Jordon Soper '15 as Tiresias, Clover Slagle '14 as the Messenger, Alex Szwez '13 as Haemon, Anna Ludlow '15 as Aphrodite and Eurydice, Alex Heilner '14 as Apollo, Fionnbharr McMahon-Allwine '14 as Dionysius, Nick Szwez '16 as Zeus, Leif Lyon-Miller '16 as the Boy, and Willem Hilliard '15, Jacob Witting '16, Adam Witham '15, and Stephen Salois '13 as Guards. Corey Gray '15, Caroline Bull '15, Aiden Ford '13, Abigail Jakub '16, Amber Wiesing '14, and Charcy Ye '15 performed as the Chorus. Aiden Ford was Stage Manager and **Keenan Hilsinger** '14 built the set and designed the lighting. Beowulf Urban '16, Olivia Henriques '14, Brionna Blodgett '14, and Jasper Benson-Sulzer '15 were part of the production staff. GSA placed second among Class B schools.

On February 4, thanks to the generous support of Downeast Audubon Society, Keith Crowley, Program Director for the Traveling Natural History Programs of the Chewonki Foundation in Wiscasset, spent a day with GSA science students. Keith gave a presentation about animal survival strategies and the environment, and brought along a few live examples: an Eastern screech owl, a little brown bat, and a baby alligator, as well as animal hides, feathers, and skeletons.

In January, teacher **Alden Colby** gave a heat pump to George Stevens Academy, to be used in the Industrial Technology classroom. Students spent a semester studying heat pump technology and learning about refrigeration, vacuums, insulation, fans, electricity, and metal fabrication. The class then made the hood necessary to shelter the heat pump, and drilled through a 10-inch concrete wall to permit the pipes and wires to connect the interior heating unit to the heat exchanger. A representative from Andy's Refrigeration of Franklin spoke to Mr. Colby's class (left) before turning on the new unit. Assistant Head of School **Buzz Moore** notes, "Teachers give so much to their students every day—knowledge, dedication, enthusiasm. And sometimes they go above and beyond, as has Alden Colby by a generous gift that provided a semester-long 'teachable moment'!"

and by my senior year could do a full recording more or less by myself."

About ISIP: "I went to college for Audio Engineering in large part due to ISIP. Kids who take advantage of this opportunity for real-world experiences walk away with more knowledge than any amount of schooling can teach."









Weston Brownlow '77 Beck Brownlow '13

Beck worked with his dad, a former contractor, to prepare a building site for a small house he designed during his ISIP last year.

Weston's ISIP: "In 1976, I did a poetry compilation, writing a poem per day with Rob Marshall as my mentor and editor. In 1977, I mentored under Bill Raiten at the Surry Zendo—with Walter Nowick as my meditation instructor—and participated in all aspects of life and work

in that community, including logging and milling lumber, animal husbandry, and gardening. I recall the immersion fondly to this day."

About ISIP: "It gives students a chance to engage with life and follow an interest in a safe and structured environment, and can allow integration into a community that otherwise may be inaccessible to them as novices."



Cammie Fowler Lepper '95 & Betsy Lepper Stevens '97 Victoria Woodward '13

Victoria spent one week each with Cammie (pictured left), a Pre-K and Kindergarten teacher at Brooksville Elementary School, and Betsy, a 6th through 8th grade special education teacher at Deer Isle-Stonington Elementary School.

Cammie's ISIP: "I job-shadowed a teacher and a professional stock photographer. Both were great experiences for very different reasons."

Betsy's ISIP: "My senior year, I worked with Dwayne Carter '80 as a PE teacher. I went

to college for physical education teaching and taught PE for six years before becoming a special education teacher."

About ISIP: Cammie: "It reinforces communication and work skills, and helps students see beyond and outside of high school, which expands their thinking."

Betsy: "Students are exposed to professions they might not experience without ISIP, and they get a chance to 'test out' different jobs."

Kiyoshi and Brad worked alongside Dwayne in his job as an elementary school Physical Education teacher.

Dwayne's ISIP: "My junior year, I went to Rackliffe Pottery and learned the art of pottery making. I made many items that I still have to this day. My senior year, I worked with Katie Greene on a very large painting. I eventually majored in Industrial Arts Educa-

tion at USM with a focus on graphics and drafting and taught Industrial Arts for two years on Mount Desert Island."

About ISIP: "It helps students figure out which direction they want to go in—and in some cases where they do not want to go, which is invaluable. It also helps them appreciate what adults do and gives them a different perspective."

Sebastian Greene '04 Nolan Ellsworth '13 & Drew Cleveland '13


Nolan and Drew studied theatrical singing techniques with Sebastian, a graduate of NYU's Tisch School of the Arts and CAP21 **Conservatory (Collaborative Arts** Project 21).

Sebastian's ISIP: "My senior year, I focused on photography, which I was really into at the time. I went to New York City and took roll after roll of film, capturing the architecture, the people, the energy. I worked on composition and lighting, and took in the grand city I would be living in later that year."

Jodi spent two weeks with Cody at Blue Hill Garage learning to fix cars.

Cody's ISIP: "I did an independent study at Blue Hill Garage and got two jobs out of it: one at McVay's during high school and college, then the one I have now at Blue Hill Garage."

About ISIP: "ISIP allows students the opportunity to work intensively at something that strongly interests them outside of the usual curriculum. Perhaps it's an area they will continue to study or eventually have a career in, or just something that has caught their attention at the time. In any case, it teaches them to work on their own and work with new people, and prepares them for what's coming after they leave GSA."

About ISIP: "It is a great program because students get a chance to actually try a profession and find out if they like it before going to school for it. When students work with me, they get to see that cars are a very complex machine, and electrical and computer skills are a must. Repairing today's cars you have to use your mind, not brawn."

Jodi Pierce '94, who lives in California and has worked in marketing for over 12 years, served as a mentor to Brionna Blodgett '14. Brionna traveled to CA to learn about freelance marketing, running a business from home, advertising on the web, copywriting, and art directing. 
