College Admissions

A gratifying note from Middlebury College's Office of Admissions:

"Every year it seems that there is one school that sticks out to me...in terms of the quality of its applicants. For me, that school this year was George Stevens Academy. At a time when so many applications increasingly seem to read similarly, there was a real sense of individuality and definition to each of the GSA applications I read. [A colleague] refers to this as texture...and it applied to all the GSA applications. As a native Mainer, I'm a bit biased toward Maine applicants, but even within the Maine cohort, the GSA applications stood out."

Local Scholarships

The local scholarship application packets have been distributed to seniors and the Scholarship Committee will begin meeting in May. Scholarships will be announced at graduation on June 12th.

College Acceptances

According to several sources, including the Daily Beast (www.thedailybeast.com), 2011 has been the toughest year on record for getting into college. There are a variety of factors that contribute to this: more and more students are applying to college, but most colleges are not increasing in size; students are applying to more colleges (GSA students applied to an average of six colleges per student); and many top-tier schools no longer offer early decision options. Next year, the competition is expected to ease slightly as high school populations are decreasing in parts of the U.S., and some top-tier schools have decided to reinstitute early decision programs.

International Night 2011

On Saturday April 9th, more than 300 students, faculty, trustees, families, and community residents filled GSA to attend the third annual International Night. Booths lining school corridors represented twenty-four different countries,

displaying geographic and demographic information, traditional garb, cultural artifacts, and—best of all yummy samples of national cuisines. The evening concluded with an all-student talent show. Admission was free, but students collected donations for disaster relief in Japan. In all, they collected \$857 to donate to the Red Cross. GSA's thirty-four international students, student ambassadors, and International Program staff made the event a huge success.



Jazz Band Reclaims Top Spot



On March 18th & 19th at Mount Desert Island High School the GSA Jazz Band, under the direction of GSA music teacher Steve Orlofksy, reclaimed the #1 spot to be crowned the 2011 Maine State Champion. It is GSA's 8th State Jazz Band Championship since 2003 and 14th since 1989. For the first time since 2006, a combo won the State Championship in Combo Division III (Sam's Soul Children). For the second year in a row, a combo won the State Championship in Multiple Combo Division B (Delicious), and for the ninth year in a row a multiple combo placed either 2nd or 3rd (Caramello, 3rd place).

Seven GSA students were named Most Valuable Players: Emmett Scott '11 in Division IV Jazz Band; Sam Eley '11 & Björn Peterson '11 in Division III Combo (Sam's Soul Children); in Multiple Combo Division B, Björn Peterson '11 & Peter Howell '13 (Delicious) and Ben Olivari '12 (Caramello); and in Multiple Combo Division A, Martin Conte '11 (9 to the Bar).

Nineteen musicians were honored with soloist awards: Beck Brownlow '13, tenor sax; Grace Bugbee '12, bass; Tom Crowe '11, trumpet; Nick Doolittle '11, trumpet; Sam Eley '11, drums; Peter Howell '13, trombone; Lucy Jakub '13, vibes; Haley Maiden '12, alto sax; Emmett Scott '11, piano; Lorna Stephens '13, tenor sax & vocals; and Zach Strehan '13, drums, all from Blue Hill; Martin Conte '11, steeldrums, and Maddie Sawyer '12, drums, both from Orland; Ben Olivari '12, trumpet & flugelhorn, and Meredith Olivari '12, bass, from Castine; Björn Peterson '11, guitar and bass, Sedgwick; Anne Ames '11, trumpet, Stonington; Nicole Bakeman '12, alto & tenor sax, Brooksville; and Nicholas Steenberg '14, guitar, Penobscot.

Math Meets Score

The 35th Annual Maine State Math Meet was held Tuesday, April 5th at the Cumberland County Civic Center in Portland. A record-breaking 99 public and private schools participated in the event sponsored by the Maine Association of Math Leagues. GSA's Math Team, coached by Math teacher Rachael Lowe, placed fourth in Division C, behind Washington Academy, MCI, and Foxcroft Academy, and ahead of John Bapst. Ned Wang '14 earned the third highest score among 9th-graders.

In the Hancock-Washington County Math League meet on March 14th, GSA's Math Team placed second overall. Eleri Liu '11 was sixth among all seniors; Candy Dai '12 and Wendy Xu '12 tied for second among juniors; William Navarre '13 placed third and Adah Chang '13 placed fourth among sophomores; Ned Wang '14 placed first and Terry Tian '14 placed second among freshmen.

Campus News



Tanzania

Thirteen GSA students along with two teachers went to Tanzania in late February. The trip was hosted by the International School of Moshi's Visiting Schools Program; the intent of the trip was to provide GSA students with an opportunity to do community service in a needy community as well as experience a very different culture. Home base for the trip was the city of Moshi at the foot of Mt. Kilimanjaro. Waking up every morning to a view of equatorial glaciers at 19,000 feet was a new experience for all of the students!

The first few days were spent investigating Moshi life and helping build an elementary school in a "suburb" of Moshi. The GSA contingent brought funds with them that helped put a roof on one school building. GSA students spent three days painting another building as well as interacting with the students and touring the community.

A second element of the trip was a camping trip on Mount Meru, a 14,000 foot volcano. The students hiked up to 8,000 feet, definitely feeling the effects of the altitude. A sunrise view across the plains to Kilimanjaro itself was spectacular, as was hiking past buffalos, baboons and warthogs, and hiking through rainforests inhabited by black and white monkeys.

The last portion of the trip was a safari to Lake Manyara and Ngorongoro Crater, one of the natural wonders of the world. Along the way we visited a Maasai village (almost losing one of our members to an international marriage) and a NGO training center for handicapped workers.



Most of the students did their Independent Study projects on this trip, using the trip to investigate specific aspects of Tanzanian culture (such as language, economics, and cuisine) or to experience Tanzania through their artistic interests with painting, music, movie-making and photography. In a reflective essay, one student wrote: "This trip changed my life forever and will change the choices I make."

George Stevens Academy sent seven Varsity sailors to Marblehead, Massachusetts, April 4th for a team racing regatta. The trip was never in doubt, even though a late season snowfall blanketed the Blue Hill peninsula with about six inches of snow. GSA came away with a few key victories and a week's worth of practice experience during the short trip. The confidence gained by the underclassmen could prove invaluable.

Making the trip for GSA were juniors Captain Courtney Koos, Steven Bell and Matt Ahern, sophomore Meredith Houghton and freshmen Nicholas Steenberg, Edward Lameyer and Gordon Lameyer. GSA was only able to stay within the ten-point threshold once during ten races against two different opponents in best-of-five contests with Marblehead and MDI on Saturday. Capsized boats in the tricky

winds led to "Did Not Finish" results for several boats during the weekend.

On Sunday, GSA got its groove back with Captain Koos (skipper) leading most races and winning first place for the team on three occasions. In the final race of the regatta, GSA finished 1 with skipper/ crew C. Koos/M. Houghton; 2 with G. Lameyer/N. Steenberg, and 3 with Matt Ahern/E. Lameyer.

In other PA news, fifteen parents have been working with the Development Office to encourage parent participation





in this year's Annual Fund. This is the second year parents have volunteered in this important effort.



Up Close and Personal with a Maine Writer







During the Fall 2010 semester, **Paul Doiron**, novelist and editor-in-chief of *Down East Magazine*, visited **Mike Kazmierczak's** *Maine Writers* class as part of that course's Visiting Writers component.

Students had read and discussed excerpts from Doiron's 2010 debut novel *The Poacher's Son* in order to explore the figure of the rugged individualist so prevalent in Maine literature. The semester-length course has long sought inspiration from *Down East Magazine*, using the January 2004 issue, "What is a Mainer?", to give shape and excitement to discussions of Maine identity. A cornerstone writing assignment in the course is a personal essay modeled after *Down East's* "my Maine" column.

Doiron spoke candidly and engagingly about how he became an editor first, and then a writer. He read from *The Poacher's Son*, talked about his writing process and what it's been like to publish his first novel, and gave students an exciting sneak preview of possible covers for his next novel, *Trespasser*, due to be published in June.

Students were enthusiastic and grateful for the visit. In their own words: "I liked how you talked about your progress and steps towards becoming the editor of *Down East*," "I think it was just awesome of you to show us your new book that isn't even out yet," "I found it interesting to learn about the logistics involved in publishing a book," "I really enjoyed reading *The Poacher's Son*; it was a book that I didn't want to stop reading!"

The Poacher's Son was named one of the fifteen best mysteries of 2010 by Kirkus Reviews, and was a finalist for the Mystery Writers of America's Edgar Award for Best First Novel.



Dear Alumni, Parents, Grandparents and Friends,

As June 30th marks the end of our fiscal year, time is running out for you to make your gift to the 2010-2011 Annual Fund. This year's Annual Fund theme, *Rich Tradition, Promising Future*, speaks to the importance of GSA's long history in molding the vision of independence, academic rigor and community responsiveness we hold for its future.

Over the past year, GSA faculty, staff, students, parents, alumni, trustees, and friends of the school have worked hard to produce a comprehensive self-study in preparation for the ten-year accreditation assessment by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC). In early April, a Visiting Committee of nine NEASC educators from four New England states spent three days at GSA interviewing constituents and assessing the school's strengths and areas for improvement. The Committee members unanimously recommended that GSA be reaccredited. Among their many commendations, they had this to say:

"George Stevens Academy has accomplished what many schools dream of— authentic community that unites all members sincerely in a single purpose: student success."

We celebrate this recognition, but also know we have much to do. We must continue to seek *the resources to ensure student success*. By making your gift this year, you are endorsing the tremendous efforts of the GSA faculty and staff to provide students with relevant and challenging academic and extra-curricular offerings.

The amount of tuition revenue GSA receives from the sending towns is determined by the state, and falls far short of the actual cost of educating a GSA student. Unlike public schools, GSA receives no state funding. And while the school did receive a generous bequest to its endowment last year, only the interest of approximately 4% can be spent each year to offset expenses. We must rely on our alumni, parents, and greater school community to help us bridge the gap.

Every gift of any size is important. The only gift that is too small is no gift at all. Your participation in the Annual Fund is so important and lies at the heart of what allows the Academy to continue to offer an outstanding academic and extracurricular program, retain highly qualified teachers, and maintain our campus. 

ALUMNI PROFILES: DUANE GRAY '64

Just about everyone in town knows

Duane Gray '64 who has been serving
the Blue Hill Peninsula community as a
pharmacist for over four decades. Since
2006 he has been the pharmacist in
charge of Community Pharmacy, located
in TradeWinds Market Place in Blue Hill.

Duane is responsible for overseeing all
aspects of the pharmacy, including laws,
policies, Medicare, Medicaid, and the
many other insurance plans. Duane began his career as a pharmacist at Partridge
Drug Store at the urging of Tom Perkins,
owner of the store.



Duane has always lived in Blue Hill, except for the five years he spent in Boston away at college. "It seems that my inner feelings tell me not to get out of sight of Blue Hill Mountain!" He received his primary education at Blue Hill Consolidated School and then attended GSA, which, he says, "prepared me exceptionally well for college, where I achieved a 4.0 GPA in my freshman year. Because GSA is a small high school, I knew everyone, and was able to participate in sports, debates, science fairs, and the like. I received a well-rounded education in both academics and life skills."

Duane has served the community in many other ways: as a member of the Blue Hill School Board, an officer at the Blue Hill Country Club, a Noble Grand of the Odd Fellows, and an officer of the Old Cemetery Association. He is currently a Blue Hill Selectman and a member of the Masons. Duane has four children: two of them, Melanie '92 and Adam '94, are GSA alumni, while a third, Andrew, will graduate from GSA this June. Many other members of Duane's family at-

tended GSA, including his father, Warren '26, and his two brothers, Robert '52 and Donald '53.

To those considering a career in pharmacy, Duane advises, "It is very rewarding to see the sick become healthy. If one enjoys chemistry and does well in it, pharmacy is the profession to go into. There is presently a shortage in the field."

Working alongside Duane is Betsy Colson Torrey '92, a Pharmacy Technician. Her responsibilities include processing prescriptions, billing to insurance companies, helping maintain inventory, providing customer service, and generally assisting Duane in his duties. Betsy has national certification from the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board. She was not clear on a career path while at GSA, "But," she says, "I knew I wanted to work in some field of science because of two very special teachers who were so encouraging and who helped build my confidence—thank you, Mr. Stanko and Mr. Bennatti! I'm still close with many of the friends I made at GSA as well as many of my teachers." To current GSA students who might be considering a career in pharmacy, Betsy suggests, "use an Independent Study opportunity to see what it's like. See if you prefer working in a retail or a hospital setting."

Using an Independent Study opportunity to explore pharmacy is exactly what Harvard Bridges '11 did during his junior year at GSA. Harvard spent two weeks working with Duane and Betsy. "The experience opened my eyes to an interesting and exciting career path that I will pursue once I graduate. I plan to attend Western New England College to study Pharmacy. I feel that I have been well prepared

for college by GSA. Having taken AP courses, I have been exposed to college-level work and I know what to expect in my college classes. I feel that everyone I've met at GSA has made me grow as a person and has helped me understand who I am and what kind of career I should go for. They have been very supportive of my future plans and have encouraged

me to pursue them." Harvard works for *Community Pharmacy* as a Pharmacy Technician during the summer months. His dad, Lennard '73, is a GSA graduate, as are his three siblings: Kate '03, Sam '06, and Mary '10.

THE TRADEWINDS CONNECTION

TradeWinds Market Place in Blue Hill has become a popular shopping destination among peninsula residents since it was built in 1999. Owned and operated by Chuck and Belinda Lawrence, it stands on the spot atop Tenney Hill where Largay's IGA once stood. But the business is an important part of the peninsula community for reasons other than shopping convenience. TradeWinds and the Lawrences have been recognized for outstanding service and philanthropy to many local non-profit organizations, among them GSA, which has long felt their loyal and generous support of so many initiatives.

In addition, *TradeWinds* offers first-job opportunities for many GSA students who are often seen at the front-end of the store as cashiers and service clerks. Many GSA alumni also work at *TradeWinds*, and for a number of them, the business provides career opportunities.

Scott Gray '77 has been the Assistant Manager for over five years, after a seventeen-year career with Hannaford Bros. Scott's daughter, Allisan, is a GSA senior, and Scott's father, Gaylor '35, is believed to be the last surviving member of the Class of 1935. Lisa Slaughter Allen '00 is the Non-foods Man-

ager and an employee for over nine years. Debbie McGraw Allen '76 is an Office Manager and has been at *TradeWinds* for over two years, following twenty-six years at Union Trust Bank. Debbie and her husband, Donald '76 (GSA's Girls Basketball coach) are parents of three GSA graduates: Jason '98, Nicole '00, and Laurie '03, and Debbie's late father, Wayne '51, was a former GSA coach and staff member. Ernie Johnston '95 is the Assistant Deli/Bake Manager, a relative newcomer having joined the staff within the past year. Beth Worden Gray '86 has worked at the store for three years and is a Seafood Associate. Beth's son, Derek will graduate from GSA in June. Nick Osgood '05 and John Turner '09 are both Deli Associates and have worked at *TradeWinds* for four and five years respectively.

What does it take to be successful during and after high school? "A strong work ethic, patience, and perseverance" were commonly mentioned traits, and one alum advises students to "remember your roots!"

The Jerold M. '33 and Diana Hinckley Professional Development Fund

At its meeting on March 24th the GSA Board of Trustees voted to establish **The Jerold M. '33 and Diana Hinck-ley Professional Development Fund** by earmarking \$500,000 of Jerold Hinckley's \$5.9 million bequest to GSA's unrestricted endowment. In 2011-12 the new fund will generate spendable income of approximately \$20,000 to support professional development activities.

GSA faculty and staff will be eligible to receive support for a wide range of initiatives and activities, for example, to pursue continuing education opportunities, attend workshops and seminars, and develop new curricular initiatives. Establishing this fund meets one of the goals of GSA's Campaign for Our Future. Rob Clapp '73, President of GSA's Board of Trustees, explained the reason for this action: "As a fund in memory of Jerry and Di Hinckley, it is fitting in many ways. Their gift to GSA was intended 'for the permanent benefit of George Stevens Academy,' and supporting the professional development needs of our faculty and staff is one of the best ways to benefit student learning year after year. The fund will not only help GSA retain excellent teachers, but will be a strong recruitment tool to attract promising new teachers to the school."

GSA Goes Green & Clean

Using its new Science Projects Room to leverage broader decisions for the whole school, GSA has made a commitment to environmental and sustainable building practices for ongoing and future renovations.

According to Brooklin resident and current parent LEED-certified architect Lauren Reiter, the Science Projects Room, scheduled for construction this summer, "upcycles" an existing conventional classroom into a modern science research room where students can work on long-range independent science projects. The room reflects a new commitment to "green and clean" construction choices in this and future building projects.

"Wherever possible," Reiter says, "GSA will seek to eliminate products containing known harmful chemicals in favor of "cleaner" materials. Flooring, wall surfaces, cabinetwork, and ceilings will be selected for being durable, easily maintained, cost-competitive, and environmentally benign. Aesthetically, materials will be, whenever possible, light-colored, to

maximize the effect of light, bright spaces."

Energy-efficiency is a goal as well. Walls and roofs will be insulated, and new, higher-performance windows will eventually replace the original single-glazed windows. Light sensors will be installed (typically saving 30% of lighting energy), and daylight sensors will automatically dim lights when adequate natural light is present. Classroom lighting will be high-efficiency pendant lighting to create softer, more "natural" lighting with less glare.

The existing energy and material deficiencies that GSA tackles are typical in buildings built decades—even centuries—ago. But the good news, Reiter says, is that "the construction market now offers many off-the-shelf products and systems to remedy existing inefficiencies and less-than-ideal materials. Thus, these renovations will take GSA from 19th- and 20th-century facilities well into the 21st-century."

GSA's *green & clean* initiative is being developed with the help of Reiter, along with consulting engineers Carpenter & Associates of Old Town.
